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Depart promptly at 8:30 a.m. from Evergreen Museum & Library, 4545 N. Charles St., Baltimore, 21210, and travel by motorcoach to Easton and Church Creek, Maryland. Return to Evergreen by 6 p.m. (traffic may impact return time). Please wear comfortable shoes and weather-appropriate clothing. Some walking will be required.

ACADEMY ART MUSEUM The day's first stop will be the Academy Art Museum, which was founded in the 1950s and has become a leading cultural hub on the Eastern Shore. Senior curator Dr. Anke Van Wagenberg will introduce us to the museum's remarkable Herbert and Dorothy Vogel collection of modern and contemporary art.

TALBOT HISTORICAL SOCIETY Society president Larry Denton, a former JHU dean, will give us a private tour of the museum. We'll also stroll through historic Easton, which boasts several points of interest, including the Third Haven Meeting House (c. 1682-84)—one of the oldest religious buildings still in use in the U.S. and the earliest dated building in Maryland—and a statue of Frederick Douglass, who was born a slave in Talbot County. The statue was installed in front of the courthouse in 2011 after much controversy.

LUNCH AT HUNTER'S TAVERN AT THE TIDEWATER INN This historic inn can trace its origins back to 1712. A choice of entrees will be available, including a vegetarian option.

HARRIET TUBMAN UNDERGROUND RAILROAD NATIONAL HISTORICAL PARK After lunch, we'll travel to this newly opened national park and visitor center commemorating the life and legacy of the legendary abolitionist Harriet Tubman. Park Service staff will provide us with a brief introduction before our visit to the informative and evocative exhibits. Adjacent to the park is the Blackwater National Wildlife Refuge, with a wide assortment of wildlife, including bald eagles, osprey, and the muskrat Tubman was tasked with trapping as a young woman. As we depart, we'll drive the roads that lead past scenes of Tubman's life and see the landscape that shaped her remarkable life as an enslaved child, young woman, and freedom seeker.
